

FROM THE PASTOR

If we look at the Old Testament, we see how God assigned there to be certain days throughout the year when certain feasts and festivals were to be held. God would describe what was to go on during each of these special days.

We are entering into the season of Lent. We know it starts with Ash Wednesday and ends with Easter. Much more than that, we may not know too much. I thought it would be good to give you a little background that you may or may not have heard.

In the Lutheran Cyclopedia it has this to say about Lent: From early days, Easter was preceded by a period of preparation called Lent. The custom of fasting during this time was generally at an early date, but the length of fast varied. Finally the fast was extended to 40 days, after the analogy of the period of the Lord's temptation. (Matthew 4:2)

Ash Wednesday (so called from the custom of daubing the foreheads of worshipers on that day with ashes of the previous year's palms, in token penitence and human mortality) has been the 1st day of Lent since the Roman Catholic missal (Roman Catholic order of service for the year).

The season of preparation for Easter ended with the Great Week also called Holy Week. We celebrate Maunday Thursday commemorating the institution of the Lord's Supper which comes either from the Latin for John 3:34 or from the custom of carrying gifts to the poor in mauds (hand baskets). Good Friday was a day of deep mourning, with a complete fast till 3 or 6 o'clock in the afternoon.

We will observe lent beginning this Wednesday, Ash Wednesday, with a soup and sandwich supper at 6PM and then the Ash Wednesday service at 7PM

EVANGELISM

“Alzheimer’s disease alters the brain, causing memory loss and personality change. This very informative and interesting booklet “explores the effect of the disease on both the patient and the caregiver” as “told through the eyes of a family experiencing Alzheimer’s”. The booklet covers the disease from the early stages through the latter stages & offers insights as to the joys and hope that are still possible throughout the progression of the disease.

MISSIONS: Our mission for January and February is Ysletta Lutheran Mission Care. On Sunday February 20th, Pastor Heimer and his wife came to Trinity to tell us about this mission. Through the adult Bible Study and Sermon, Pastor Heimer informed us what the mission does and some of the difficulties of running the mission. Following the service there was a potluck dinner in the great room. Pastor Heithold provided a yummy brisket and many others provided delicious side dishes to go along with it. After the dinner, Pastor Heimer briefly shared more information about Ysletta with us. A door offering was taken for the mission and amounted to \$218. Next month I will report the total giving to Ysletta through the January and February offerings.

The mission for March and April will be Lutheran Hispanic Missionary Institute. The mission of the LHMI is preparing workers to multiply healthy Hispanic Ministries. The Institute trains men and women as missionaries, lay leaders, and leaders who will go on to serve as called church workers to sow the seed of the Gospel among Hispanics.

AFRICA MISSION: Pastor Cram will be going to Africa again, likely in the latter part of April. His ministry in Africa is teaching Seminary students. This is a call for donations to help Pastor Cram continue this Africa mission. Please when you donate to this, specify Africa.

The Evangelism Committee has purchased lanyards for the nametags. The lanyards will make it much easier to use the nametags. Since nametags are a good Evangelism tool, we hope that with the addition of the lanyards people will start using the nametags again.

Mission Grant #6 - Hope of Christ for Cancer Patients - Phil's Friends — \$70,000

As Christians, we are charged with sharing the message of the Gospel and the Word with all individuals. The mission of Phil's Friends, an LCMS Recognized Service Organization, is to introduce and strengthen relationships with Christ by providing faith-based hope to those with cancer. The support includes a care

package with practical, emotional, and spiritual items, including a Bible, a card sent monthly for 12 months, and a new program “Hope on Call,” in which Phil’s Friends’ trained volunteers meet virtually with the cancer patient to talk and pray. This grant would further fund Phil’s Friends Cancer Care Packages, Cards of Hope, and Hope on Call. *Watch the video about this mission grant on the LWML.org website!*

**Mission Grant #7 - Training Pastors to Serve the Church in Russia
Lutheran Theological Seminary, Novosibirsk, Siberia — \$100,000**

Through the efforts of the Siberian Evangelical Lutheran Church and the pastoral training provided by the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Novosibirsk, Siberia, the Word and Sacraments are again making their way to the long-repressed Russian people. With this grant, Lutheran Women’s Missionary League will partner in training pastors and deaconesses and in helping the seminary continue its efforts to restore the Lutheran Church in Russia. The Novosibirsk seminary’s goal is to prepare workers to spread the true Word of God to the Russian people. This grant will fund some of the operational expenses of the seminary and allow it to continue providing a solid theological education to those seeking to serve as pastors and deaconesses within the Siberian Lutheran Church.

**THE LONG LOOK OF LENT
THE WINDOW, BY HERMAN W. GOCKEL**

After the assassination of Abraham Lincoln, while his body lay in state, a great procession of mourners passed by his casket. In the vast throng was an elderly Negro woman together with her four-year-old grandson, who held tightly to her hand.

As they came up to the bier of the great emancipator, the aged woman stood motionless for a long moment, looking at the lifeless form of her slain benefactor – hot tears running down her cheek.

The she stood and lifted up the little boy so that he, too, could see the body of the dead President. Wiping the tears from her eyes, she said to the lad: “Honey, take a long look at that man, He *died* for you!”

Indeed, he had done just that! He had given his life so that that little lad – and millions of other like him – might live their lives in dignity and freedom. And, as few other men whom that lad would ever see, he deserved “a long look”.

In and unspeakably higher sense the Christian world is pausing during these days to take a “long look” at the One who gave His life so that *all* men might be free – free not from an earthly taskmaster but from the slavery of sin, death, and the power of the devil.

THE MAN ON THE CROSS who engages our attention during these days is none other that the Son of God, who loved us and gave Himself for us – the Lenten Lamb who bled and died so that we might be forever free from the guilt, the power, and the punishment of sin. He died *for us!* He died “for *our sins*,” the Scripture tells

us. (1 Corinthians 15:3)

How important that each of us find time for the long and quiet look of reverent contemplation. Not just a passing glance, but a long and thoughtful look! The look of penitence. The look of faith. The look of gratitude. The look of love. The look of unconditional self-surrender.

*Behold the Savior of mankind
Nailed to the shameful tree!
How vast the love that Him inclined
To bleed and die for thee!*

WITNESSES TO CHRIST: PEOPLE FROM HIS PASSION

John tells us why he wrote his Gospel: “Jesus did many other signs in the presence of the disciples, which are not written in this book; but these are written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in His name” (John 20:30–31). Life! When we believe that Jesus is the Christ, God gives us life—abundant life, forgiven life, and eternal life.

Historically, the Fourth Gospel is likened to an eagle—an image that suggests John soars to heights of glory and grandeur. That’s because the evangelist paints a stunning portrait of Jesus, who is the bread of life, the resurrection and the life, and the way, the truth, and the life. Life in Jesus. That’s God’s gift to you!¹

This Lent, our life in Christ will be strengthened as we hear the witness of those in John’s Gospel who journeyed to the cross. Along the way, we’ll meet villains, such as Barabbas and Pontius Pilate, as well as sinners, such as Peter (who denied Jesus *three* times), Mary Magdalene (who was possessed by *seven* demons), and Judas Iscariot (who betrayed Jesus for *thirty* pieces of silver).

Midweek of Lent 4: *Barabbas*, John 18:33–40

Midweek of Lent 5: *Pontius Pilate*, John 19:1–16

Maundy (Holy) Thursday: *Judas Iscariot*, John 13:21–30

Good Friday: *John, the Gospel Writer*, John 19:25–37

The Vigil of Easter: *Nicodemus*, John 19:38–42

The Resurrection of Our Lord: *Mary Magdalene*, John 20:1–18
