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FROM THE PASTOR

Jeremiah. 29:11 For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord, plans for welfare and not for evil, to give you a future and a hope.

This verse was from a letter Jeremiah sent to the exiles in Babylon. They probably wondered about their future. Did they have thoughts that God had abandoned them? Did they take time to think of how they maybe were responsible for their situation? Did they wonder if things would ever get back to what it once was?

Jeremiah wrote this letter to encourage them. He wanted to paint a picture of good things coming out of all this. I'm sure as they read this letter or it was read to them they couldn't imagine it happening and yet it would, a few years down the road but God came through as He always does with a deliverance greater than what they could have ever imagined.

We are now into spring. We are making plans to get a garden planted, to maybe this year, get to go on vacation, we might even get to take that mask off and not have to remember to have one with us everywhere we go.

Yet, he heard the words of eternal life from the lips of one who was going through what he was going through. As he looked in faith to Jesus, he knew those words could be trusted and so he did.

We have the promise of Jesus too. He has plans for us and in the mean time we cling to Him and His promise to us, Matthew 6:25-26 "Therefore I tell you, do not be anxious about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, nor about your body, what you will put on. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds of the air: they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? And then the writer to the Hebrews gives us another point: Hebrews 13:5 Keep your life free from love of money, and be content with what you have, for he has said, "I will never leave you nor forsake you."

He is going to be with us as we make plans and set our minds on the things we want to do in the days ahead. May He help us to always be open to His directing as we go to Him for guidance in our lives.

Our media upgrade, donated in memory of Oscar (Doc) Marquardt, has been completed. We are learning how to get the best output from the sound and camera but overall comments as to sound quality and hearing ability have been positive. Jose Lugo installed the network equipment the week of the first. We now have a firewall to prevent unwanted access to our data. Signal strength throughout the building is very good. Final cost was \$676.00 less than was estimated.

On Thursday, March 11th, Jan and Vicki reported problems with trying to print to the main printer (they would get a “blue screen of death” notice and their computers would shut down! We learned on Friday that the problem was caused by a Microsoft update! Jose and I worked on the problem and then I performed a restore point operation Monday afternoon. That seemed to solve the problem. However, on March 19th the problem reoccurred on Jan’s computer. I uninstalled the Microsoft update and restored the system to a previous point.

LENTEN SERIES – 2021 “ A CALL TO RETURN”

HOLY THURSDAY: In the book of Joel, the prophet paints a vivid picture of the coming judgment of God, the day of the Lord. But right in the middle of this frightening portent of judgement, we find a tender invitation from the Lord: “Return to the Lord your God for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love; and he relents over disaster” (Joel 2:13b). During this season of Lent, we will consider this “call to return,” and how it played out for those who walked alongside Christ during His Passion, and for us today. Jesus invites us to join Him once again at the Table. He repeats the invitation again and again because He feeds us in order to build us up and strengthen our faith. His invitation draws us into a place where we have fellowship with all believers. And yet, our fellowship is stained by sin: “Truly, I say to you, one of you will betray Me, one who is eating with Me” (Mark 14:18). We are not asked to root out the offender, not commanded to judge one another. That is God’s task, not ours. Instead, Jesus gives us His own body and blood, and with it a promise: “This is My blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many” (Mark 14:24). His invitation to return is accompanied by His promise to make all things new, when once again we will share the fruit of the vine with Christ Himself. © 2020 Concordia Publishing House. Scripture: ESV®.

Throughout this season of Lent, we have heard a drumbeat call from God to return to Him, and today we rejoice that this call was issued so that we might have life in abundance through the One who lived, died, and rose again to secure our salvation. Our journey has led us through some dark places, and we have grappled with the implications of our sin in many different forms, but today the call is especially personal; it is about what it all means for you. We are called to come and see the Christ; to see the salvation won for us; to see the life that He has secured; and to see the Word that we are to share with others. BE A CAREMONGERER

At the start of the coronavirus pandemic, a mutual-aid movement dubbed as “caremongering” quickly spread throughout Canada. Within 72 hours, 35 Facebook groups were launched so people could request and offer assistance.

This altruistic effort is essentially the opposite of fearmongering. “We wanted to switch that around and get people to connect on the positive level,” says Mita Hans, who helped set up the first group. The movement, she adds “spread the opposite of panic in people, brought out the community and camaraderie, and allowed us to tackle the needs of those who are at-risk all the time—now more than ever.”

One disabled man in Halifax who received aid through a caremongering group said it felt “like a hug.” That’s intentional, says participant Valentina Harper. “I think it is really showing people there is still hope for the humanity.” When the pandemic is history, may we all continue to be caremongers in our communities.

April 18th will be celebrated as "Here I Stand" Sunday, the 500th anniversary (to the day) of Martin Luther's defense at the Diet of Worms. There will be additional information forthcoming. One item in the planning is the showing of the film "Martin Luther" that was produced for the 500th anniversary celebration of the start of the Reformation.

Join Lutherans across the nation in celebrating “Here I Stand” Sunday, a special 500th-anniversary observance endorsed by delegates to the 2019 convention of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS).

2019 Resolution 4-09 calls on God’s people and all LCMS congregations to “gather for worship celebrations ... spend time in prayer, asking the Lord to continue to bless the proclamation of the Gospel” and to receive thank offerings to be used toward the continued proclamation of the Gospel throughout the world.

Although this resolution was passed prior to the pandemic, the goal remains the same: to encourage continued comradery across the Synod.

Therefore, encouraged by the confession of Dr. Martin Luther, we gladly bring to mind the truth that to gather in the Lord’s name and around His Holy Word and Sacrament is to be joined always to the full number of saints — both around the world and in eternity.
