2019-2021 National Mission Grant 4

God's Grace for This Generation, LAMP Ministry Inc. - \$100,000

LAMP Ministry Inc. has ministered for nearly 50 years in northern Canada where many villages are reachable only by aircraft or seasonal roads. Currently, nearly one million Indigenous people live in these isolated areas with about half of them under the age of 14. The most alarming statistic is that over 15 percent of children and youth will actually take their own lives out of despair and hopelessness. When LAMP goes into these communities with VBS, Bible studies, and personal witnessing, these communities will have access to Christian education for faith in Christ. In order to fulfill their mission of sharing the gospel in the next few years, LAMP will need to expand their staff of full-time missionary pilots to four or five. LAMP will need to recruit and train 100 to 200 more volunteer missionaries committed to serve at least five years. This grant will provide the funds to help LAMP reach their goal.

2019-2021 Mission Grant 5 God's Word Changes Everything, Lutheran Bible Translators - \$95,000

Martin Luther wrote, "I wish that this book alone, in all languages, would live in the hands, eyes, ears, and hearts of all people." When people have God's Word, it changes their lives in ways they couldn't imagine. Lutheran Bible Translators is training people from churches in Ethiopia and Tanzania to translate the Bible into their own languages as a part of seminary training. This will be four-year project with 15 trainees working each year. The funds will be used to equip pastors and lay leaders in the translation of God's Word in the numerous local dialects for the benefit of their Tanzanian and Ethiopian people in their everyday worship.

Rocky Mountain District LWML Grants for 2018-2020

We are making progress with our Mission Grant Goal for 2018–2020 and have the following amount left to raise by March: \$19,800 Please, Please continue with your MITE Giving!

Biblical Orthodox Lutheran Mission, Grant Amount: \$7,500.

Biblical Orthodox Lutheran Mission (BOLM) has a worldwide outreach with the Gospel, but targeted mainly to Arabic-speaking peoples in general and to Muslims in particular. This is done mainly through internet, TV, radio, and printed materials. There is a lot of secrecy, because of the persecution an ex-Muslim can experience (from a simple loss of a job to Christian martyrdom.) Much of the contact is on a one-to-one basis. This grant would help supply three (3) months expenses for the Internet Seminary and local office expenses for one year. This mission recently received RSO status with the LCMS.

Lutherans for Life Post-Abortion Crisis Hotline, Grant Amount: \$5,000.

In a world where even Lutheran women and men are faced with decisions regarding pregnancy, LFL operates "Word of Hope," the only crisis hotline specifically addressing post-abortion issues. The 300 people who contact Word of Hope each month are offered forgiveness and grace by faith alone and not faith plus works, according to

Lutheran doctrine. The grant would help expand the hotline outreach by increasing staffing (currently only 10 hours/week availability) with an ultimate goal of hiring a full-time director. Along with this, LFL would launch promotion efforts to Lutheran congregations with distribution of brochures and literature about Word of Hope for more opportunities to guide hurting people into a relationship with the Trinity.

Some innovative musicians play instruments that actually melt at their fingertips. Their ice creations — everything from drums and a pipe organ to harps and didgeridoos — make awe-inspiring sounds (search online to hear for yourself).

The unique challenges posed by dissolving instruments seem to increase their impact. "ICEstruments" sculptor Tim Linhart says concertgoers, whose bodies also are largely composed of water, often feel a "spiritual connection" to the music.

Although people don't melt, our physical bodies eventually return to ashes and dust. Despite that impermanence, God created us as wonderful instruments to make joyful noises for him: "Let everything that has breath praise the Lord!" (Psalm 150:6).


